- (5) The 81mm Mortar Platoon elso provided the battalion with fire support, shooting on-call missions and close~in H & I's.
- b. Air Support
  - (1) During the operation, fifty-nine sorties of fixed wing were utilized with a BDA being generally unobtainable due to the dense vegetation and high canopy. UN-LE's were used on four fire suppression sorties.
  - (2) Eight emergence or priority medevac missions extracted twelve medevacs. Routine medevacs were evacuated on the resupply helicopters. The time element for medevac missions was lengthened due to the fact there were few landing zones in the area and the medevacs had to be carried to a suitable landing zone.

#### 6. Intelligence.

- a. Throughout the operation the enemy continuously harassed BLT 1/3 (-) by staying within a few hundred meters from the front lines. Night probes were made with a consistency not normally experienced with the VC/NVA. The contact made by Company B on 29 October 1967 was believed to be the outer perimeter defense of a much larger force. The enemy was well dug-in in fighting holes and bunkers. Weapons used in this perimeter defense were entirely automatic weapons.
- 7. <u>Mission</u>. BLT 1/3 (-) on D-1 provide one reinforced contact as a regimental reserve. At L-Hour, D-Day conduct a helicopterborne escault to seize a d secure Landing Zone Buzzard (VIC YD 465217). Upon reorganization conduct search and destroy operations toward objective B (VIC YD 485218). On order conduct search and des roy operations toward objective D. La strate Btry A,

- 5. Execution. At 201155 Company B commenced believer essault into LZ Melteria (VIC 470237) and secured the loading zone. The Melteria bed in eX Malbard for the night and at first light the next morning continued the attack and secured battalion objective 1 at 1300 cm 27 October 1967. The second destroy operations in the vicinity of battalion objective 1 at 280730=H. Company A and Company B companies conducted search and destroy operations in the vicinity of battalion objective 1 at 280730=H. #### 10. Administrative Matters

- a. <u>Postal</u>. Mail was delivered to the BLT rear aboard ship and at Phu Bai; sorted and delivered to the field regularly.
- b. Logistics. Unit resupply of all classes of supply was effected by helicopter from the 4th Marines LSA at Camp Evans. No difficulties were encountered other than limited helicopter availability which upon several occasions resulted in the problem of Logistical Support being a major consideration in tactical planning.

- c. <u>Treatment of Casualties and Evacuation</u>. Casualties were evacuated to the USS Okinawa, and to Camp Evans 4th Marines dispensary and to "A" Med at Phu Bai. Terrain, vegetation and weather posed difficulties on medevacs; primarily in locating and clearing satisfactory Landing Zones.
- d. <u>Communications</u>. Radio relay teams were established on Hill #674 to provide good communications with no difficulties encountered.

#### 11. Commander's Analysis

During the initial heliborne assault there was an unacceptable amount of confusion in the pickup zone and the landing zone. The confusion was caused by the fact that the pickup zone control officer did not know where the helicopters were going to land and he did not know how many troops each flight of helicopters would take. The landing zone was long and the build up in the landing zone was too fast. The large number of troops scattered over a large long area (approx. 800meters) caused the loss of tactical integrity. This is unacceptable during an assault landing. The problems were caused primarily by the large number of helicopters, 4 UH-10's, 30 UH-34's, 4 CH 53's and the variance of troop loads.

It is recommended that in future mass heliborne assaults, less helicopters be used and that the heliteam be standardized to five men.

factory. The problem was that helicopters continuously flew across the trajectory of the artillery rounds causing a check fire. It is

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recommended that helicopter approach and retirement lanes be established for each operation and that helicopters be required to strictly follow these established lanes.

No significant problems due to the nature of the terrain were encountered that were not anticipated.

Btry A, 1st Bn 12th Marines located at 137642 provided direct support fires for the BLT. Additional direct support fires were delivered by W Btry 3rd Bn 12th Marines Located at Con Thien, when A/1/12 ran low on fuses. General support reinforcing fires were not used.

- c. <u>Air Support</u>. During the operation two command and control flights were utilized to gain tactical information concerning troop movement and disposition, and to study the terrain in the operating area.

On 10 and 11 November an 10 was on station during the daylight hours, and was used to check specific coordinates, provide a general reconnaissance of the operating area, and to control fixed wing. Four sorties of fixed wing and two UH-lE Gun Ships were used in direct support of the BLT. Additionally, numerous flights of fixed wing in direct support of other units were coordinated through BLT one slant three A.L.O.

6. INTELLIGENCE. The enemy was well dug in, in bunkers in the objective areas. During the encounter at 110900H on objective B, the enemy let most of the elements of one Company pass through their positions, and then opened Cire on the Company Commander and his two radio operators. It is considered most hat the enemy was surprised, as the Company swept through from the blind or the east side of the positions, and realizing he was they pod picked



on the cost likely target to destroy before he himself was destroyed or captured. The bunkers sere well constructed of logs and dist, and would accommodate one of two men. The fields of fire were mutually supporting, but

one of two men. The fields of fire were managing supporting, but oncentration was generally restricted to the front of the positions, tacks, down, In the encounter at 111500H near objective D, the bunkers were similarly

constructed, but the enemy was not suprised. However the enemy did fail to open fire on the assaulting troops soon enough, and was trapped and killed before inflicting many casualties.

One wounded POW was captured in the second encounter, and in preliminary interrogation revealed information concerning his mission, unit location and future intentions. He claimed to be a squad leader in an infantry battalion which had been operating in the area for about one month.

Assorted documents and propaganda leaflets were captured and forwarded to regiment. Included among the documents was a list of squad members and unit identification. The propaganda leaflets were the same, all containing a statement by Bertrand hussell asking U.S. troops not to fight in Viet Nam. The leaflets were published by the National Liberation Front.

The enemy employed sporadic 82mm and 60mm mortar fire against the savancing columns of the BLT on 11 November 1967.

All the NVA KIA's were by body count and were confirmed kills.

- 7. <u>Mission.</u> From 6 through 9 November 67, and from 12 to 16 November 67, BLA 1/3 had the mission of Division Reserve. On 10 November 67 BLT 1/3 was directed to move to an attack position vicinity <u>YD 13370</u>2 just short of the tisch. At H-Hour on H-bay attack to the north across the trace to seize objective B. Following seizure of objective B, attack west and seize objectives D and H. Following seizure of objective h, on order, withdraw to the Southeast and occupt assembly area vicinity 123664.
- c. <u>Execution</u>. BLT 1/3 occupied defensive positions in the vicinity of C-) from 6 through 9 kovember 67 as Division Reserve. On 10 and 11 November c7, the BLT moved with two up and two back to the attack position, and utilized the same formation during the assualt on objectives B<sub>2</sub>D and E. The 81md Forter plateon provided direct support fires from a static position with Yackeen Station near Con Thien. The withdrawal from the assigned assembly un a at C-3 to Dong Ha was by tactical motor march. BLT 1/3 remained Division reserve while at Dong Ha until 0900 16 November 67. The BLT was on 30 minute notice for possible commitment from 121900H until 160900H November 1967.

#### 10. ADMINISTRATIVE MATTERS.

- a. POSTAL. Mail was delivered while BLT 1/3 was in a reserved posture.
- b. LOGISTICS. Logistical Support was provided from the established LSA Dong Ha on D-1 Via resupply trucks. An additional meal per individual was obtained on D-day and delivered to BLT 1/3 Via LVTP. Only class V and limited Class II priority resupply was effected. No particular problems or difficulties were encountered.
- TREATMENT of CASUALTIES AND EVACUATION. All Casualties/Casualty Equipment were evacuated to Co.D lst Med Bn Dong Ha. Casualty reports were relayed through the LSA Dong Ha to the BLT 1/3 Rear Via land line or 49000.
- c. <u>COMPUNICATIONS</u>. Logistic communications were effected via HST net. Communications overall was excellent particularly considering the wet weather conditions encountered.
- 11. <u>COFMANDER'S ANALYSIS</u>. The successful completion of BLT 1/3's assigned mission, to seize objectives B, D and E was due to several factors.
  - a. Adequate dispersion so as not to offer a desirable artillery, mortar or rocket target.
  - b. Use of appropriate formations in relation to the terrain and changing situations, to ensure all round security.
  - c. Immediate aggressive reaction by the fire teams and squads when taken under fire.
  - d. Adherence to the sound basic principles of offensive tactics.

5. <u>Supporting Forces</u>. Due to lack of enemy contact, the requirements for strict adherence to rules of engagement, and the open friendliness of indigenous personnel in the AOA, little use was made of supporting forces available to the BLT for actual combat.

a. Artillery Summary.

(1) Direct support artillery fires were provided by Btry A, 1st Bn, 12th Marines located at 345695.

(2) General support artillery fires were available from the LVTH-6's

b. <u>Naval Gunfire Summary</u>. Four Naval Gunfire Ships were available for use by BLT1/3, however, no naval gunfire missions were required or utilized.

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- c. <u>81mm Morters Summary</u>. BLT 1/3 placed its organic 81mm Mortars in General support for the operation. Only one mission was fired and it consisted of two rounds of 81mm mortar illumination.
- d. <u>Air Summary</u>. During the operation, BLT 1/3 utilized twelve UH-1E sorties in a cover/fire suppression role. Twelve sorties were flown in support the BLT by the CTG 79.4 staff aerial observer either in an unarmed UH-1 or an H-34. Four command and control missions were flown to enable the battalion commander to better evaluate the terrain and observe and control movement during the operation. All resupply was effected by H-34 and all routine medewac's were extracted by the resupply helicopters.
- 6. <u>Intelligence</u>. Prior to commencement of the operation, there were reports of VC and VC sympathizers north of Grid Line 72 and possible rocket caches located within the AOA. An Armed Propaganda Team with Co A obtained a list of names of VC and VC sympathizers in the Hamlet Mai Xa Thi on the night of 24 November 1967. At approximately 0845 on 25 November, elements of Co A discovered a fifteen year old boy whose name was on the list. The youth readily admitted to being a VC for the past two months. Local inhabitants reported that the VC had moved both north and west as Marine elements approached the villages in the area.

Only one minor contact with the enemy was reported. On 25 November at 2125, an unknown number of VC fired small arms into a position occupied by a Co D ambush.

There were no mining incidents or other harassing activities, as the enemy chose to avoid contact and apparently moved out of the area.

7. <u>Mission</u>. At L-Hour, on D-Day conduct a helicopter borne assault into LZ Robin (YD 297694), alternate LZ Cardinal (YD 303708). At H-Hour conduct an amphibious assault over Green Beach (center coordinates YD 324720). Conduct initial search and destroy operations against NVA/VC to southwest. Subsequent movements on order CTG 79.4. Designate reserve company to be committed on order CTG 79.4.

#### 8. Concept of Operations.

a. Commencing H-Hour, D-Day BLT 1/3 landed over Green Beach in LVT's and LCM's with two companies in column, seized and secured the beach and approaches thereto, and on order moved abreast in a coordinated search and destroy operation to the southwest attacking and seizing objectives 1 and 2.

b. Commencing L-Hour, D-Day BLT 1/3 landed one company by helicopter in LZ Robin, seized and secured the LZ, and on order moved in a coordinated search and destroy operation to the southwest to attack and seize objective 3. One Company was assigned initially as SLF reserve

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aboard the LPH including a Sparrow-Hawk platoon size reaction force. This company was released to the control of BLT 1/3 and landed in LZ Robin, assuming the mission of BLT Reserve.

d. Objectives 4, 5, and 6 were attacked and seized with two companies up and two back, followed by an amphibious withdrawal of all BLT 1/3 elements from White Beach (centered coordinates 339700).

9. Execution

Sequence of Events

240700H Company B landed on Green Beach First elements of Company C landed in LZ Robin. 240700H Company A landed on Green Beach. 240705H Alfa Command arrived LZ Robin. 240745H Companies A and B were on Phase Line GOAT. 240810<sup>H</sup> First elements of Company D landed in LZ Robin. All units of BLT 1/3 on Phase Line RAT. BLT objective 1 240825H 240920H secured by Company B. BLT Objective 2 secured by Company B. 241210<sup>H</sup> Companies A and C on BLT Objective 3. 241225H CTG 79.4 objective A secured by BLT 1/3 241400H 241800H Frag. Order #2 given to all units of BLT 1/3. 241900H Unit Positions: Company A coodinates 286673, Company B coordinates 287677, Company C coordinates 286675, Company D coordinates 286674. 250850H Company A apprehended one VC who was posing as a buffalo tender at coordinates 287673. He was identified from a village blacklist carried by a member of the APT. BLT objective 4 secured by Company C. 250945<sup>H</sup> BLT objective 5 secured by Company C. BLT objective 6 251200<sup>H</sup> secured by Company B. CTG 79.4 objective B secured by BLT 1/3. Frag Order #3 given to all units of BIT 1/3. 251820H Unit Positions: Company A coordinates 273705, Company B 251900H coordinates 282706, Company C coordinates 267705, Company D coordinates 284705. A Company D ambush received incoming small arms fire at 252125H coordinates 286706 and relocated their positions. BLT 1/3 commenced a deliberate search and destroy operation 260730H toward the Southwest. 261200H BLT1/3 arrived at a location near the mouth of the north bank of the Cua Viet River. APT'S were detached from BLT 1/3. 261600<sup>H</sup> Frag order #4 given to all units of BLT 1/3. 261800<sup>H</sup> Unit Positions: Company A coordinates 333704, Company B 261900<sup>H</sup> coordinates 337707, Company C coordinates 333704, Company D coordinates 337704. Beach Jumper Units detached from BLT 1/3. 270705H 270715H BLT 1/3 commenced an amphibious withdrawal from White Beach coordinates 339700. 271145H BLT 1/3 completed the amphibious withdrawal from White Beach **UNUTERIDO** 





271200H Operation BALLISTIC ARCH was terminated for BLT 1/3. BLT 1/3 was chopped Op-Con to the 9th Marines.

#### 10. Results.

- a. Friendly Losses. None
- b. Enemy Losses. One POW
- c. No equipment, ordnance, food or supplies of any type, belonging to the enemy were found or captured.

#### 11. Administrative Matters.

a. <u>POSTAL</u> Mail was delivered while BLT 1/3 was in a defensive posture with normal resupply.

b. LOGISTICS. No logistics problems of any kind were encountered. All resumply was effected by helicopter, utilizing company landing zones. Medevacs were flown out on resupply helicopters. C-rations were provided for all meals but one, which consisted of sandwiches, fruit and coffee flown ashore from the ships of ARG Alpha.

#### 12. Commander's Analysis.

a. In the area of communications, six frequency changes were required due to mutual interference with each other, or with other stations operating in the immediate vicinity. One frequency was assigned to both BLT 1/3 and 1st Bn 11th Marines.

b. Surf conditions for the landing of LVT's over Green Beach were marginal a H-Hour, and resulted in the LVT's taking on a considerable amount of sea water. At times the water inside the LVT's was knee deep. Also two Marines were swept from the top of the LVT's into the sea; fortunately they were rescued. c. Intelligence concerning the AOA appeared to be somewhat outdated, or inaccurate in regard to the current enemy situation. No fighting holes, bunkers or fortifications of any kind were uncovered during the operation. Further indications of enemy activity were negligible except for one incident on the night of 25 November when Delta Company's ambush received several rounds of incoming small arms fire. The area appeared to be quite pacified and the indigenous personnel were very friendly.

#### 13. Recommendations.

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a. That a closer check be made by the frequency coordinator at Division level to prevent two units being assigned the same frequency, or frequencies close enough to cause mutual interference.

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b. That better information on sea and surf conditions be obtained prior to landing elements by surface means over the beach. Surf conditions were considered hazardous for landing the LVTP-5's.

c. That the intelligence collection effort in the AOA covered by BLT 1/3 be reevaluated.
